STRAW BALES NEEDED

TRAINING TIPS

Good dogs don't just happen. It takes a lot of training to make a really great dog. Training also creates a bond between a pet and his humans and teaches family members responsibility. It is important to include children in the training process.

Walking on a leash is an important step. Always have your pet walk calmly beside you, not in front of you and not pulling. Keep the leash short. If he pulls, either stop walking until he quits pulling and

then start again or give a quick jerk on the leash. Don't jerk too hard as that may cause injury to his throat or neck. Just enough of a tug to get the pet's attention will work. A correct walk will make you in charge of the walk and establishes your leadership. Once your pet is trained by adults, have your children take turns walking the dog and establishing their leadership as well.

Another command to train is "off" when your pet jumps up on anyone, especially children and visitors. Give the command and push your pet down. Hold him there for a second and let him know he has done the right thing by offering a "good boy." Eventually adding "sit" when he meets people will make him quite the good citizen.

The "sit" command will be handy on many occasions. Hold a treat just above his nose and push it back slowly until your pet's butt drops to the ground. Hold for a second and then give a "good boy" and the treat so he knows he got it right. Gradually increase the time of the "sit" so it lasts a few seconds or so.

"Stay" should be an easy step from "sit." Put your pet in "sit, then say "stay" and don't move for a minute. When he does this successfully, give "good boy." Once he has that down, put him in sit/stay and walk away a few steps, wait a minute. As you practice gradually increase the distance from you and the time of the "stay." Be sure to give an enthusiastic "good boy" every time he succeeds.

"Come" is an important command for your pet's sake and safety, as well as a convenience for you. Start when your pet is a short distance from you. Call his name and say "Come!" When he comes to you, give an enthusiastic "good boy" and lots of affection. Gradually increase the distance between you—across the yard or from another room. Always reward his correct behavior. Never punish your pet if he comes when called. If he leaves your yard, for example, but comes back when called, don't punish him for leaving the yard. He will associate the reprimand with coming back, not with leaving the yard and you will undo your hard work with teaching "Come"! Give a "good boy" for coming back, though it might not feel right to you.

Adding treats to the process can be a great motivator for pets. Eventually you can wean your pet off the treats. Always give enthusiastic praise and petting with or without the treats.

Keep commands short, single words when possible, and make sure everybody uses the same commands. If one person uses "get down" and

another uses "off" for the same behavior, the pet will be confused.

Use clear, distinct commands. If you use "down," "get down" and "lie down" for three different behaviors, the pet may confuse them because they are similar sounding commands.

Clear hand signals in addition to verbal commands may help pets identify commands and may eventually be used alone.

Give commands firmly. Use a serious tone for all commands so your dog knows you're not playing. Use your baby voice for play time and love fests.

After teaching these basic commands you may move on to other commands and tricks more easily because you have established yourself as the boss.

Be sure to include children in all of the training. It will assure their leadership role with the pet and teach them responsibility, too.

The more positive training you accomplish, the better pet you will have and the less you will need reprimands.

Keys to remember are lots of praise, practice and patience! Even Lassie wasn't built in a day!

If your health, finances or housing make it necessary for you to surrender your pet, CCHS may be able to help.

Call the CCHS at 526-4500 to start the process. You must provide your pet's medical history from your vet, a photo and a completed surrender

from your vet, a photo and a completed surrender application with information about your pet's personality and training, and your pet will be tested for adoptability.

The surrender form is available online at ceilhs.org or at the building at 1301 Apple Lane in Breese.

If all goes well, he will be added to the CCHS roster, and the search for his new family will begin.

There is no charge for surrendering your pet.
