AVOID BITES!

As more and more dogs are out socializing on the streets and in the parks, you want to avoid unsocial and dangerous situations that might result in a bite.

Do not approach dogs without owners present, including dogs that are running loose, chained, fenced, or near food or toys.

Never assume that a dog is friendly.

Approach dogs accompanied by their owners in a friendly, calm manner. Chat with the owner to create a relaxed setting, and then ask the owner if it is okay to pet his dog.

If the dog steps toward you, it may indicate that he wants to meet you.

Approach the dog calmly and a little to the side, wheas opposed to head on. Avoid staring at him, but watch for body and tail signals that indicate that you are not welcome.

Gently put out the back of your hand for the dog to smell. Slowly turn your hand over and gently smooth his cheek, and then slide your hand back to his neck.

Unless the dog has an issue, most dogs like being gently scratched behind their ears and on the neck.

Avoid reaching directly over his head to pet him. His nose will follow your hand and his mouth may open. Sometimes folks jerk their hand back thinking the dog is about to bite. That jerk may startle the dog and cause problems.

Avoid leaning over the dog or hugging him. Dogs may interpret that as a dominant gesture.

Avoid staring him in the face, as that may seem like a challenge to a dog.

Avoid smiling so big your teeth show.

Watch for signals.

If a dog steps back from you, respect that as a signal that he is not interested in meeting you. Don't push it.

A tail held high and stiff body, a tongue flick and a stiff tail wag, a tucked tail even if it wags a little, a head turned away from you, a dog that freezes and stares, and even yawning may mean the dog is unsure or not interested. Don't approach.

Whether you are a dog owner or a person meeting a dog, learn to watch for signals so greetings don't end up with a bite.

CCHS Meet and Greets are held the first and third Saturdays each month. Folks can stop by and meet the CCHS adoptable pets. Micro-chipping for your pet will also be available for \$25, including registration.

The next regular CCHS meeting will be held Wednesday, Apr 9, at 7 p.m. at Knotty Pine in Breese. Meetings are open to the public and new members are always welcome.

If your health, finances or housing make it necessary for you to surrender your pet, CCHS may be able to help.

Call the CCHS at 526-4500 to start the process.

You must provide your pet's medical history from your vet, a photo and a completed surrender application with information about your pet's personality and training, and your pet will be tested for adoptability.

The surrender form is available online at ceilhs.org or at the building at 1301 Apple Lane in Breese.

If all goes well, he will be added to the CCHS roster, and the search for his new family will begin.

There is no charge for surrendering your pet.
