All CCHS pets are vet checked, up-to-date on shots, spayed/neutered and micro-chipped. Dogs are heartworm checked, and cats are also feline leukemia negative and litter box trained. PET TAGS MAY BRING YOUR LOST PET HOME QUICKLY

Pets sometimes wander off unexpectedly or run during a storm.

If your pet is wearing a tag with his name and your phone number, all it will take to get him home is a phone call.

Cheap and easy! Remember “A tag in time saves your canine” or feline for that matter.

Another good way to improve your pet’s chances of getting home is to microchip him.

A collar and tag could be lost, but a microchip is actually inserted under your pet’s skin.

This tiny implant carries a number to identify your pet.

The company where the chip is registered will contact you if your pet turns up at a vet, shelter or the police.

Micro-chipping costs a little more, but chances are it will never be lost and will last for the life of your pet.

SPAY AND NEUTER YOUR PETS! It will help control overpopulation of unwanted pets and will make your pet healthier and happier.

CCHS holds Meet and Greets the first and third Saturdays of each month. Folks can stop by and meet the CCHS adoptable pets at the Aviston 150 Celebrteion at Aviston East Park from 10 a.m. until noon Saturday, May 17. Micro-chipping for your pet will also be available for \$25, including registration.

The next regular CCHS meeting will be held Wednesday, June 11, at 7 p.m. The group is currently make plans for the "Bark for Life" in October and will need volunteers to help. Meetings are open to the public and new members are always welcome.

If your health, finances or housing makes it necessary for you to surrender your pet, CCHS may be able to help.

Call the CCHS at 526-4500 to start the process.

You must provide your pet's medical history from your vet, a photo and a completed surrender application with information about your pet's personality and training, and your pet will be tested for adoptability.

The surrender form is available online at ccilhs.org or at the building at 1301 Apple Lane in Breese.

If all goes well, he will be added to the CCHS roster, and the search for his new family will begin.

There is no charge for surrendering your pet.
